




Arlington Point in Time Count



VETERANS: WHO ARE THEY?



- Represent all branches of the military
- 61% are homeless for the first time
- 52 years old
- Typically male
- Majority have income
- Experience homelessness for 4.5 months
- 58% seek shelter
- 42% stay outside

FAMILIES: WHO ARE THEY?

- Typically a single parent, likely a mom
- 51% are homeless for the first time
- Average of two children with them
- Average age for kids: 6 years
- 69% work or are seeking work
- Experience homelessness for 2.5 months




YOUNG ADULTS: WHO ARE THEY?




- 36% are homeless for the first time
- Most likely to be young women
- 36% have income
- 40% have aged out of foster care
- 76% seek shelter
- 24% sleep outside









HOUSING DEVELOPMENT


\$50M is in the pipeline to build housing for people exiting homelessness. In Partnership with Fort Worth and Tarrant County, this will create over 300 new units over the next two years.

HIGH PERFORMING SYSTEM

Our community has been rewarded for having a high performing system.
Secured:

- 368 additional state rental vouchers
- \$2.5M from Day 1
 Families Fund
- \$20M in HUD CoC funding




- High performing system with innovative solutions




Household Type




Preferred Housing Choice

Unique Challenges for Arlington

- Workforce needed for tourism economy
